Dear Parishioners,

I write to you in my new role as Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Killala. As such, I wish, firstly, to pay tribute to Bishop John Fleming who has retired after twenty-two years of generous and exemplary service. I know his dedicated, innovative and caring pastoral leadership is much appreciated by the people of this diocese. Bishop John brings a great energy and clarity to everything he undertakes. During those years you have witnessed his wise, good humoured and sensitive leadership. The collaborative work he carried out over that time makes it possible for this period of transition to begin from a very strong foundation. I wish Bishop John good health and many years of happy and active retirement.

Having now assumed my new responsibilities in Killala, I look forward to meeting with each of the parish communities and the various committees that are so much part of the life of your diocese. My first step will be to get to know the people and places, beginning with the priests.

Over the past while I engaged in a consultation process carried out by the Apostolic Nuncio with a variety of representative groups from the Western Province, particularly in the dioceses of Achonry, Elphin, Killala and Tuam. During these meetings it became clear to me that our dioceses of Killala and Tuam have more in common than we might have realised, and what really shone through for me was the understanding that the proposed union between Tuam and Killala would allow each diocese to be mutually enriched by the heritage and culture and the variety of practices of the other.

The Diocese of Killala has been planning for the future, as is clear from 'The Synodal Pathway in Killala Diocese, Placing Hope in Faith'. This is an excellent document which is, quite clearly, the fruit of listening and dialogue done under the inspiration and guidance of the Holy Spirit. I am excited about the future, and I am encouraged by the pastoral energy already so evident to me in this diocese. I look forward, therefore, to working with you in preparing the dioceses of Killala and Tuam for formal union by the Holy See in the not-too-distant future.

Together, then, let us pray for the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit as we move forward together in hope.



SUNDAY LETTER

Series: The Church: Fourth Sunday of Easter, Year B, 21 Apr 2024

WALKING WITH THE PEOPLE

Traditionally, the Fourth Sunday of Easter is known as "Vocations' Sunday". It is the day on which we pray for the gift of priestly and religious vocations. Most of us who are either priests or religious say that we do not feel worthy of our vocation.

None of us chose by ourselves to be priests or sisters, brothers or nuns; we all admit that we have been called, chosen by the Good Shepherd himself, to follow him in this way of service.

The grace that we pray for this Sunday is for others to hear the call of the Lord, and to have the courage to follow it. However, the word "vocation" is not all about priests and religious. The word "vocation" applies to all Christians, most of whom have a vocation to marry and start a family.

The Shepherd Reveals God

The image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd reveals to us the mystery of who Jesus is – both God and man. Throughout the Old Testament, God is often presented as a shepherd who cares for his people, who guides them along the right paths if they are true to his name, the one who protects them from their enemies ... those wolves that attack and scatter the flock. The image of God as one who cares for his sheep

Summary

He is the Shepherd who became one with his flock.

The image of God as one who cares for his sheep tells us who God is in himself, and of his relationship with us.



tells us who God is in himself, and of his relationship with us.

Our God is not some angry, demanding god who despises his people and treats them as enemies. He is not a God who has to be placated and "jollied along". Rather the God we see in the Scriptures is a Good Shepherd caring for and watching over his people – those whom he loves.

Jesus: The Good Shepherd

In the Gospels Jesus tells us that he is the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for his flock. He isn't forced into this role; the Scriptures tell us just how freely God behaves. We see in the actions and words of Jesus the words and actions of a God who, literally, lays down his life for his flock. He is the fulfilment of all that has been said of God in the Old Testament.

The Good Shepherd is one of us. He is the innocent lamb whose sacrifice takes our sins away. No longer does the shepherd lord it over his flock; instead, he leads and guides the flock.

We are the presence of the Good Shepherd in the life of the Church.

Question

How does the image of a Good Shepherd help us to understand God?

Prayer

Lord, may I follow you and so become your caring hands.

One of Us

We are already the children of God and, in Jesus, we see what that word means. Jesus the Nazarene is one with us, and also one with God. In his humanity he brings the image of the Good Shepherd close to us, so we now know that God cares, and holds us in our need for love and forgiveness. God is not a distant God, he is with us and understands us from within our own stories.

Some Have Betrayed

Those of us who have heard the call to follow the Good Shepherd follow his example and become the caring hands, the listening ears, the tired feet of a pilgrim people. We are the presence of the Good Shepherd in the life of the Church. We know only too well that some of those whom the Lord called have fallen away from the example of the Good Shepherd and, instead of listening to Jesus' flock, have betrayed him and become wolves among the little ones. However, the reality of sin must never be allowed to blemish the image of the true Good Shepherd, which is Christ Jesus the Nazarene.

Faithful Followers

As we pray this Sunday for vocations, let us pray that those who hear the voice of the Good Shepherd and follow him will always be faithful representatives of Jesus the Nazarene, the one who came to serve and not to be served, the one who laid down his life for his sheep.
